

Comments on demographic changes

- Depopulation of Serbia results exclusively from negative natural growth which has been negative since 1992 and the negative rate has been growing continuously from 2001 onwards.
- On 1 January 2006, Serbia had 7 395 600 inhabitants altogether, which is by 83,000 less than in 1991 and by 131, 000 less than in 2001.
- In the 1991-2006 period, the total population of Central Serbia decreased by more than 206,000 or 3.7%, while that of Vojvodina increased by 23,700 solely because of the arrival of refugees in the 1991-1996 period.





I. 2. Forcible migrations

- ➤ The forcible migration of more than 5 million people began in the early 1990s in former Yugoslavia.
- Almost a million of the refugees (about 95% of which were Serbs) settled down in Serbia on temporary or permanent basis.

1.2.1. Refugees in Serbia

- In 1996 about 600 000 refugees made8% of total population of Serbia
- Regional origin: Bosnia 74%, Croatia 25% other 1%.
- ➤ National origin: Serbs 77,5%,
 Montenegrins 6,5%, Muslims 5,2%,
 Yugoslavs 3,9%, Croats 2,2%, others
 4,2%

I.2.1. Refugees in Serbia

▶ In 2002 about 379 135 refugees made 5,1% of total population of Serbia, 9,2% of Vojvodina

Regional origin: Croatia 61,5%, Bosnia 34,7%, Slovenia 1,6%, Macedonia 1,6%, other 0,6%.

Il external migration

- Several hundred thousand migrants from Serbia have been working and staying abroad on a "temporary" basis since the 1970s.
- Average duration of stay: France-17,6; Germany-15; Austria-14,6; Switzerland-14,4; Italy-6,8
- According to the 2002 Census, number of migrants has increased by over 50% more than in 1991.

Transit migrations

- Serbia is transit country for transit migrants due to geo-political position (manly illegal)

- Estimations: several thousands of transit migrants from Meddle East, Albania, Africa etc., yearly.
